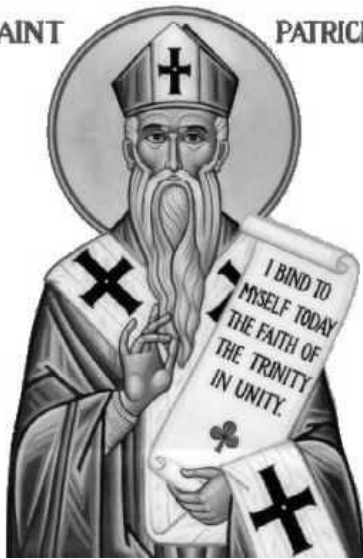

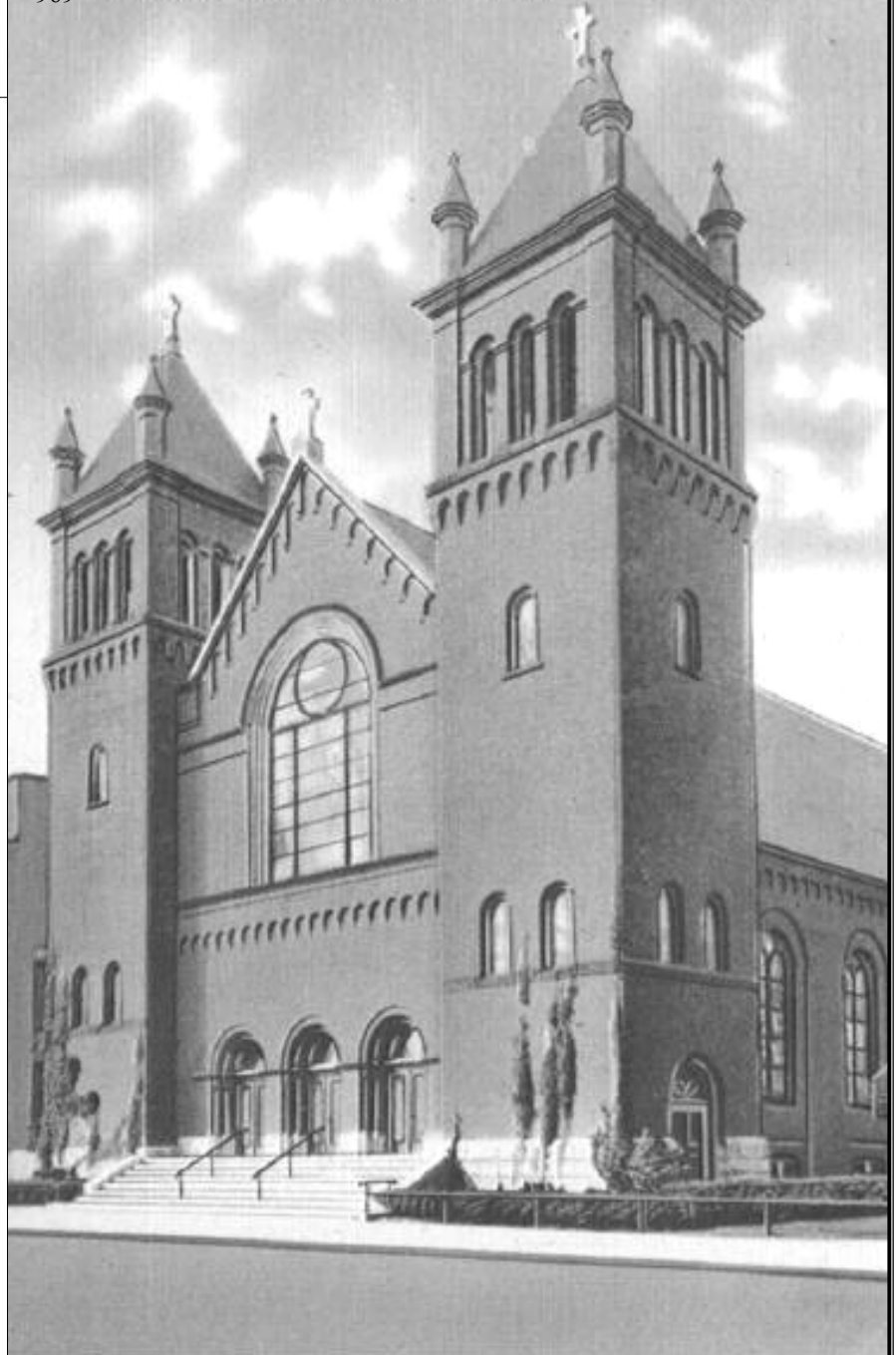

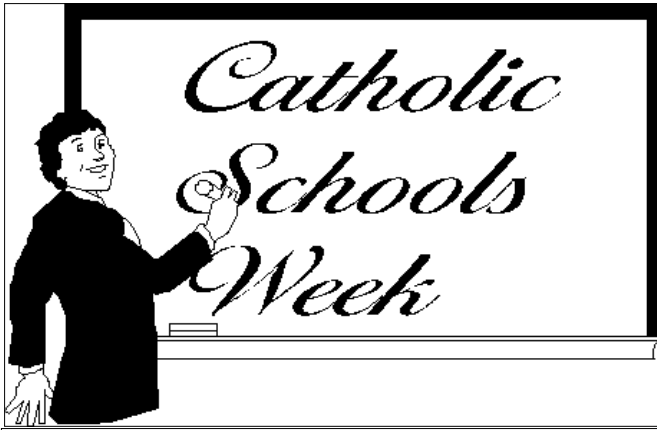

The Sign of Peace

Occasionally people who visit St. Patrick's ask: What happened to the sign of peace? We stopped doing it for two reasons. First, two year's ago the Diocese asked us to warn people about physical contact during the flu season. Rather than make such an announcement at every Mass, we just stopped the sign of peace and haven't restored it, except on a few occasions.

Second, our church holds 850 people. The average Mass has less than 200 people, widely scattered throughout the church. Many have no one nearby. In light of this it became obvious that we were not really following the rubrics. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal states: "It is appropriate, however, that each person offer the sign of peace only to those nearest and in a sober manner." Waving to someone 20 feet away doesn't seem to be a "sober" or reverent gesture. Quite the opposite. It can seem silly.

Those who wrote the rubrics surely foresaw a situation like ours, and so they made it optional. The relevant rubric states: "Then, if appropriate, the Deacon or the Priest, adds, "Let us offer each other the sign of peace." Given the size of our church and the preference for scattering, the sign of peace does not seem appropriate – usually. For example, at the 4:00 PM Mass on Christmas Eve we had the sign of peace because everyone had a neighbor. To omit it at that Mass, which had many visitors, would have seemed a little odd, even inappropriate.

Most people who have expressed an opinion about the sign of peace have favored dropping it, not primarily for hygienic reasons but because they felt that the waving, chatting, and so forth immediately before Holy Communion was somewhat irreverent.

Of course, some people don't like the sign of peace because they regard it as a post-Vatican II innovation. But it isn't. From the earliest times, the Eucharist has had a sign of peace. In its original form it was actually a true kiss, wet lips touching someone's face. Gradually, the kissing became somewhat awkward as the Church grew, even attracting some new members who were more interested in the kissing than the rest of Mass. In response, the kissing was shifted from the face to the hands of the nearest person. Eventually, the kiss of peace became completely "stylized" as a very stiff embrace among only bishops, priests, and deacon. It completely disappeared among the lay faithful. Hence, the sign of peace as we now have it is really a *restoration* of an old tradition, though in a modified form.

We must always remember that the sign of peace is not about sociability or "building community." Rather, it was always a symbolic affirmation of the need for reconciliation before daring to approach the altar for Holy Communion. At one time, the kiss of peace was exchanged at the conclusion of the Prayer of the Faithful (Intercessions). It was placed there to signify that communal prayer should always conclude with mutual forgiveness. Eventually, it followed the Lord's Prayer as the symbolic response to the petition, "forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." For a long time, exchanging the kiss of peace was a necessary prerequisite for receiving Holy Communion.

In itself, the sign of peace is quite minor, indeed optional. Though we may dispense with the ritual, we may never put aside its true meaning: Reconciliation with enemies, especially easy. Keeping the Lord's commandment is not.
