Divine Mercy Sunday and “Private Revelation”

Last Sunday, the Church celebrated the Feast of Divine Mercy, which now coincides with the Second Sunday of Easter. After Pope St. John Paul II formally established the feast, the Church decided to keep the prayers and readings of Easter II in place.

Pope St. John Paul’s decision to establish the feast was extraordinary because the Divine Mercy Devotion originated in the *private revelation* received by St. Faustina in the 1930’s.

The term *private revelation* refers to spiritual experiences – visions, spoken words (also called locutions), and miraculous occurrences – given to individual believers *after* the death of the last apostle, the so-called “closing of public revelation.” These occasions of *private* revelation never add anything to *public* revelation – the core of our faith as reflected in Sacred Scripture and the constant teaching of the church.

So, what’s the point of having private revelation if it doesn’t add anything? In some respects, private revelation is related to the charism of prophecy. The Hebrew prophets drew people’s attention to forgotten or subdued aspects of God’s *public* revelation. In a similar way, recipients of private revelation emphasize some particular part of God’s overall message. In the case of St. Faustina, her mystical writings and associated devotions all stress the unfathomable mystery of Divine Mercy.

Private revelation is intimately tied up with the particular concerns of specific historical periods. In its core, genuine private revelation always repeats standard biblical teaching, but it does so with language and images attuned to a specific era. As such, devotions linked to private revelation arise, become popular, and sometimes completely disappear. Take devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, which emerged from the spiritual experiences of St. Margaret Mary Alacoque in the late 17th century. At one time almost every Catholic Church had an image of the Sacred Heart and many people practiced First Friday devotions. Now almost no one keeps the nine First Fridays and in newer churches one almost never sees the Sacred Heart. The devotion served its purpose and has now declined.

The Divine Mercy Devotion emerged within the historical conditions of the 1930’s, a time marked by endless war, economic disaster, deep pessimism about the prospects for humanity, and growing doubt about the very existence of a loving God. Moreover, many people still envisioned the Lord as a vengeful and distant judge who granted salvation to very few people. In light of the terrible situation in Europe, especially in St. Faustina’s own homeland of Poland, the Divine Mercy Devotion flourished because it provided consolation and hope to suffering people. Like the prophetic movement of ancient Israel, the Divine Mercy Devotion corrected an unbalanced view of Christ as an “angry God.”

How should we regard private revelation? While always admitting its possibility, the church never requires anyone to believe any private revelation, even when transmitted by canonized saints. This position rests on two points. First, *public* revelation needs no supplement. All that we need to know has already been revealed. Second, private revelation gets filtered through human beings who can make theological mistakes. There are no instances of absolutely “infallible” private revelation.

In the case of the Divine Mercy Devotion, one finds nothing really new, just the simple and beautiful reaffirmation that Mercy is God’s greatest attribute. The Easter Octave is the perfect day for the Feast of Divine Mercy, which has become brilliantly visible through the Easter Mystery: the Passion, Death and Resurrection of Christ.
