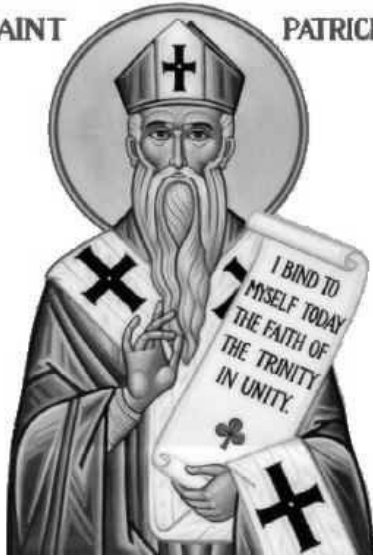

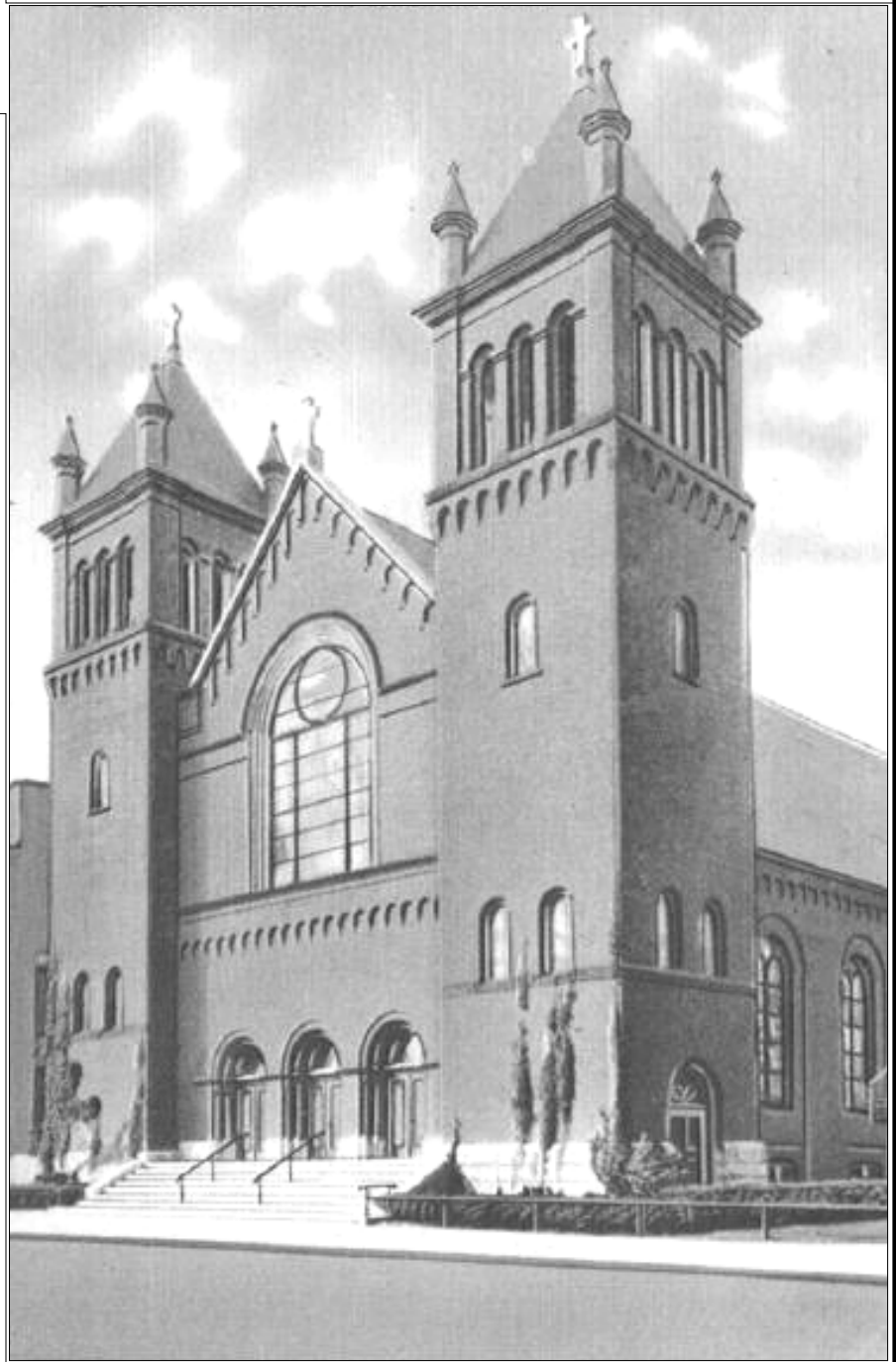

Cash, Checks, and E-Giving

In these changing times, cash and checks are becoming obsolete. This widespread trend has an impact on our parish. Banks, including ours, now prefer electronic “cashless” transactions.

In light of this remarkable change, we respectfully encourage everyone to consider using the “Bill Pay” service of their bank or credit union. This involves replacing cash or paper checks with an electronic check sent to St. Patrick Parish. Many already do this for their other recurring payments, such as cable TV, insurance premiums, and so on. It is a fairly easy process to add St. Patrick’s. Switching to electronic giving will help the parish in four ways:

- Saving money by eliminating costly church envelopes.
- Making it easier to generate documentation for tax purposes.
- Simplifying the complex process of counting loose cash in the weekly collection.
- Providing a stable flow of income uninterrupted by vacations and bad weather.

At the moment, about 10% of our income arrives in our bank account in some electronic form. Please take a look at your current on-line “Bill Pay” options and consider helping our parish adjust to the new ways of the banking system. 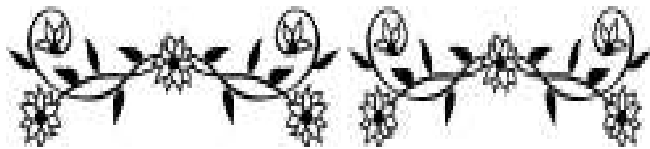

Christians: Always aliens

The Roman Breviary begins the Easter Season with the First Epistle of St. Peter. Rather than addressing believers as Christians, St. Peter refers to them as "all those living as *aliens* in the Dispersion" (cf. 1 Peter 1:1). The word "alien" translates the Greek word "paroikia," which means a foreigner who lives among people who hold common citizenship in a specific country. These "foreigners" come to the "host country" as exiles from their homeland, which has undergone some type of disaster.

From very early times, local groups of Christians came to be called "parishes," which comes from "paroikia." The word "parochial" is even more clearly derived from the Greek. Christians, then, viewed themselves as groups of exiles living *within* hostile societies and cultures.

This Christian self-identification as "aliens" and "exiles" flows from Israel's own self-understanding. Beginning with Abraham, God's Chosen People were always moving, always a minority, always displaced, and always profoundly different from the Gentile nations.

God, through the Law and the Prophets, constantly exhorted the Israelites to view the "resident aliens" within their own society as indispensable reminders of their own status as "aliens," notably during 400 years of slavery in Egypt. Hence, aliens were accorded numerous rights and any abuse of aliens was regarded as gravely offensive to God because He had embedded them within Israel.

Early Christians like St. Peter understood themselves as a continuation of Israel, and so immediately picked up the term "parish" -- exile/alien community -- for themselves.

The Resurrection of Christ is the foundation of our exile/alien status in two ways. First, through Baptism we have become closely united with Christ and therefore "pulled out" of the broader human community. In this regard, Christians resemble Israel, which God "pulled out" of the Gentile nations.

Second, we are "exiles" and "refugees" in that we are *truly displaced* from our true homeland. How so? Our homeland is our place of *origin* and our *destination*. Neither is truly here. As such, all earthly citizenship is provisional, not permanent.

In that the Risen Christ has defied and conquered death, he is the true "alien," who gloriously leads us away from this "valley of tears" back toward our Homeland, which is Heaven. Every parish, then, is not a permanent destination but merely a way station on the journey home.
