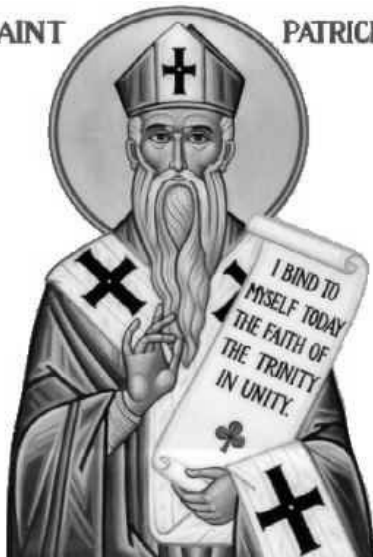

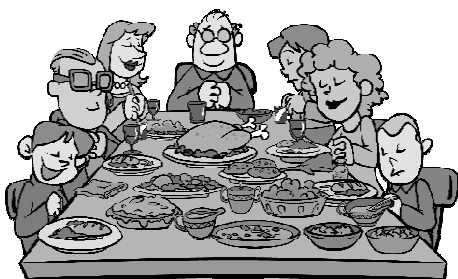
ROSARIES FOR AFRICA

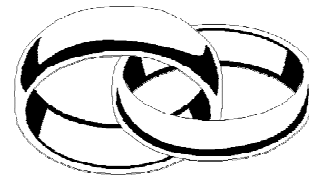
**Summer Reception Funds

St. Gregory the Great

A careful examination of church history reveals a constant alternation between corruption and reform, degeneration and virtue. While evil characters often commandeer the spotlight, we need to look at the heroes as well. This week, on September 3, we remember one such heroic figure: Pope St. Gregory the Great.

Born in 540, Gregory began life in a household marked by privilege and wealth. His father held a seat in the Roman Senate, which assured that young Gregory would have power and prestige if he so desired. By the age of 33, Gregory had already become the “prefect of the city,” an office roughly equivalent to city manager of Rome. After a brief time in power, Gregory sold his property, gave every penny to beggars, and became a Benedictine monk. Despite his ardent desire to live as a poor monk, Pope Pelagius II compelled Gregory to leave the monastery and accept a top administrative position. Gregory served well, but continued to live austere as his fellow monks did. In 590 he was elected Bishop of Rome, a post he never really desired or sought.

During his life, Gregory produced numerous works, including a commentary on Job, a life of St. Benedict, and a handbook for bishops. This last work is so touching because Gregory revealed his own intense struggles and doubts as a pastor. Though writing 1400 years ago, Gregory’s deepest concerns have a familiar ring. Among other things, he lamented the poor quality of priests serving in Rome and throughout the church. He also complained that pastors often degenerated into managers rather than becoming spiritual leaders.

Regarding priests, he wrote these poignant words: *“Look about you and see how full the world is of priests, yet in God’s harvest a laborer is rarely found, for although we have accepted the priestly office, we do not fulfill its demands.”*

Gregory always fretted about the poor quality of preaching, both in terms of relevant content and the conformity of the preacher’s life to the gospel. He himself shuddered to think that he was not living according to the gospel, thus giving scandal to those who heard his sermons.

As a Benedictine, Gregory always sought to keep the proper balance between administrative work and prayer. After criticizing his fellow bishops – and himself – for becoming “managers,” he wrote: *“We are wrapped up in worldly concerns, and the more we devote ourselves to external things, the more insensitive we become to the spirit.... We get involved in irrelevant pursuits and neglect the performance of our ministry.”*

Though a man of immense power, Gregory always lived plainly and humbly. People loved and admired him so much that he was declared a saint by virtual acclamation when he died on March 12, 604. Usually a saint’s feast day coincides with the day of his or her death. Gregory’s feast is a rare exception to the rule. His feast day, September 3, is the anniversary date of his coronation as Pope in 590. Gregory’s life reminds us that God always cares for the church by raising up good and holy leaders.
