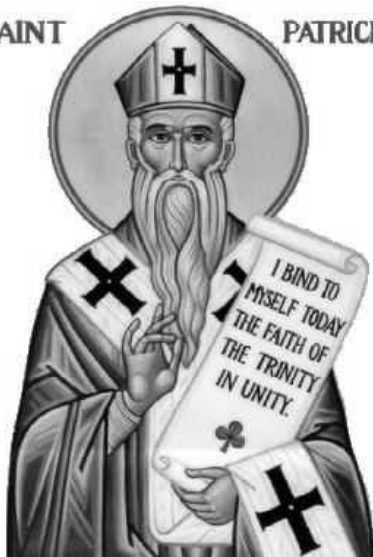

Domestic Work: The Blessed Virgin's "Pre-Christmas Retreat"

On the Sunday before Christmas this year we hear the story of the Visitation -- the meeting between Mary, who was pregnant with Jesus, and Elizabeth, who was pregnant with John the Baptist. We usually stop with the very pleasant scene of the mutual greeting exchanged by Mary and Elizabeth. We quickly forget the rest of the story: three months of hard domestic labor done by Mary. At the time, she was perhaps 14 or 15 and carrying a baby. Can you imagine Mary's ordeal as she cared for a much older woman who was pregnant for the first time of her life?

In the Middle Ages some theologians debated whether Mary, the Mother of the Lord, had ever perspired. Some imagined her as a privileged lady of leisure. But St. Luke's clear remembrance of her as housemaid, midwife, and visiting nurse to Elizabeth strongly suggests that she did indeed sweat. Her knuckles probably got raw from scrubbing floors; and her knees and back probably ached from the hard work she did for three months in the home of Zachariah and Elizabeth.

We must always remember, then, that the Blessed Mother's "pre-Christmas retreat" consisted of back-breaking work even while she carried the Son of God within her own body.

There's great meaning for us here. The "domestic captivity of Mary" teaches us that ordinary work and the tedious care that we give to others is somehow holy, somehow touched by the Divine.

Mary's sweating, aching and endless work before the first Christmas was a preview of what her own son would do. "Like mother like son." After Gabriel had announced to Mary that she would conceive and bear a son, she said, "Behold, the handmaid of the Lord." She identified herself as a "handmaid," which translates the Greek word *doule*, which literally means slave.

Jesus himself was also identified as a slave. He died a slave's death. Indeed, in the reading from the Letter to Hebrews today, we hear Jesus say that his whole purpose was to give himself totally to God. Not just in words but deeds.

During the Christmas Season, there's lots of work, visiting, cleaning up. Some people spend much of their lives as caregivers to the elderly, difficult children, and those in need. All of that work and care is sanctified; it's all holy because it was done by Mary who bore the Son of God.

Did Mary sweat? Did Jesus sweat? Who knows for sure? We do know, however, that all their simple and hidden deeds of love intermingle with ours and reflect the goodness of God who unites Himself with Humanity at Christmas.
