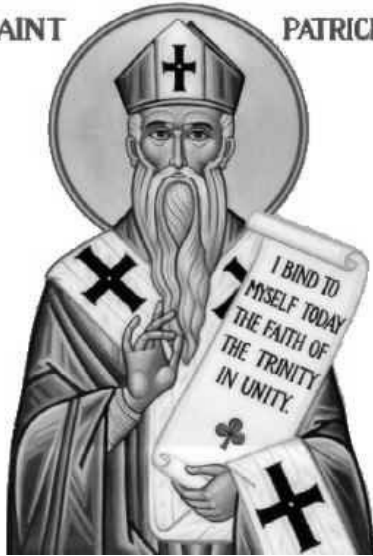

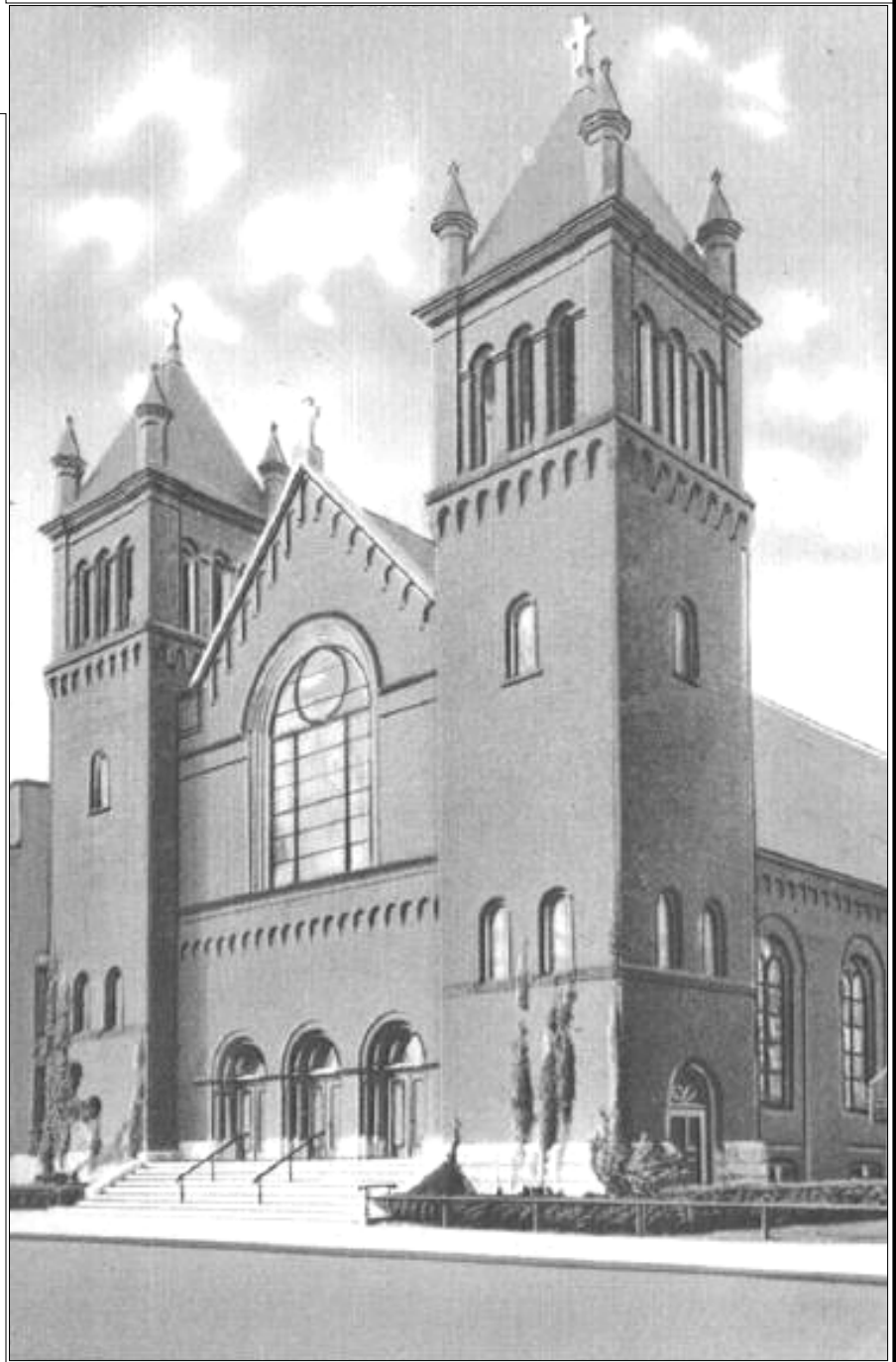

### *Current Special Collections*

At St. Patrick's we do not pass the basket for second collections. Instead we invite people to consider the many appeals that come before us during the year. Information about the appeals and associated special envelopes are available on the back tables and in the vestibule. Thank you for considering these needs and acting according to your considered judgment and own resources.

Currently we are receiving offerings for the following purposes:

### **Retired Religious Sisters and Brothers**

Every December the Church in the United States has a special collection for retired sisters and brothers. These funds support thousands of retired religious who served Catholics so well, especially in parish schools. We will receive donations for these good women and men through Advent.

### **Christmas Flowers**

Envelopes are available in the vestibule for people who would like to make memorial donations for Christmas flowers in our church. We will compile a memorial list and publish it on January 8, 2017.

### **St. Patrick's Capital Campaign**

Our Capital Campaign, which began last January, has been very successful, having raised 75% of our \$850,000 goal in just 10 months. ## *Catholicism, Blogs, and Internet Chatter*

Recently someone asked me about the "purge" of a Pontifical Council in Rome. Supposedly Pope Francis suddenly changed everything, fired the staff, and brought in people of other religions. This story was received by some Catholics as more convincing evidence that the Holy Father is really not a faithful Catholic. After doing some research, I discovered the source of the alarming story: a blog based in Germany with a history of criticizing the Holy Father.

A few weeks earlier someone had directed my attention to a dispute at Providence College about a Catholic professor who had caused a stir by posting critical articles on a website.

These two small incidents demonstrate the danger of the Catholic Internet world: we have become awash in "information" which is mostly gossip. Worse still, this gossip earns money by stirring up conflict and feeding on it.

Here's what's happening. Because the Internet is virtually universal and transmits "news" instantaneously, we now have access to information we never had before. For example, who would have heard about the internal affairs of a Pontifical Council in Rome or Providence College? Only "insiders." Moreover, such knowledge is worse than useless because it causes anxiety about matters which do not concern us.

With so much "inside information" floating around our computers, we need "gatekeepers" who sift through piles of data, condense it, interpret it, and dispense it via blogs, Facebook pages, feeds, and so forth. Many bloggers cultivate a flock of "followers" who then become "customers," either by buying "premium" memberships or "Catholic products," such as gourmet coffee, books, magazines, trips to Rome, papal cologne, and other things.

Almost all Catholic blogs reflect some sort of broader ideology that goes beyond "mere Christianity," to steal a term from C. S. Lewis. After all, who wants to read about the lives of ordinary Catholics who dwell in standard Catholic parishes oblivious to the latest controversies in Rome? Blogs can't be boring, so they need plenty of conflict, real or imagined. Hence, every hiccup becomes a massive heart attack and every pimple becomes a deadly melanoma.

For sure, the Internet has some good things. But, sad to say, some popular "Catholic blogs" probably produce more harm than good. Here's how to evaluate a blog. After reading it, please ask these questions: Do I feel closer to the Vicar of Christ or do I view him as an enemy or, more kindly, a fool? Do I trust that the Holy Spirit really acts within the Church or do I believe that she will soon collapse? Do I grow in joy, patience, openness, and forbearance of others or do I become more fearful, anxious, and angry?
