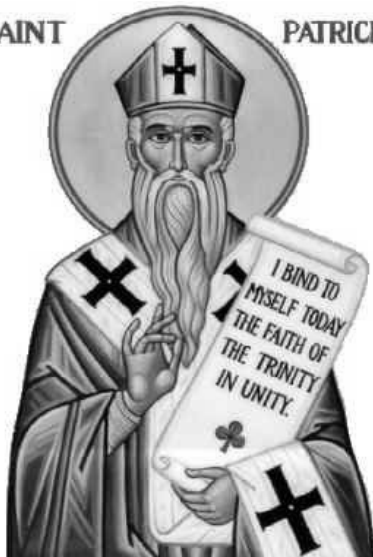

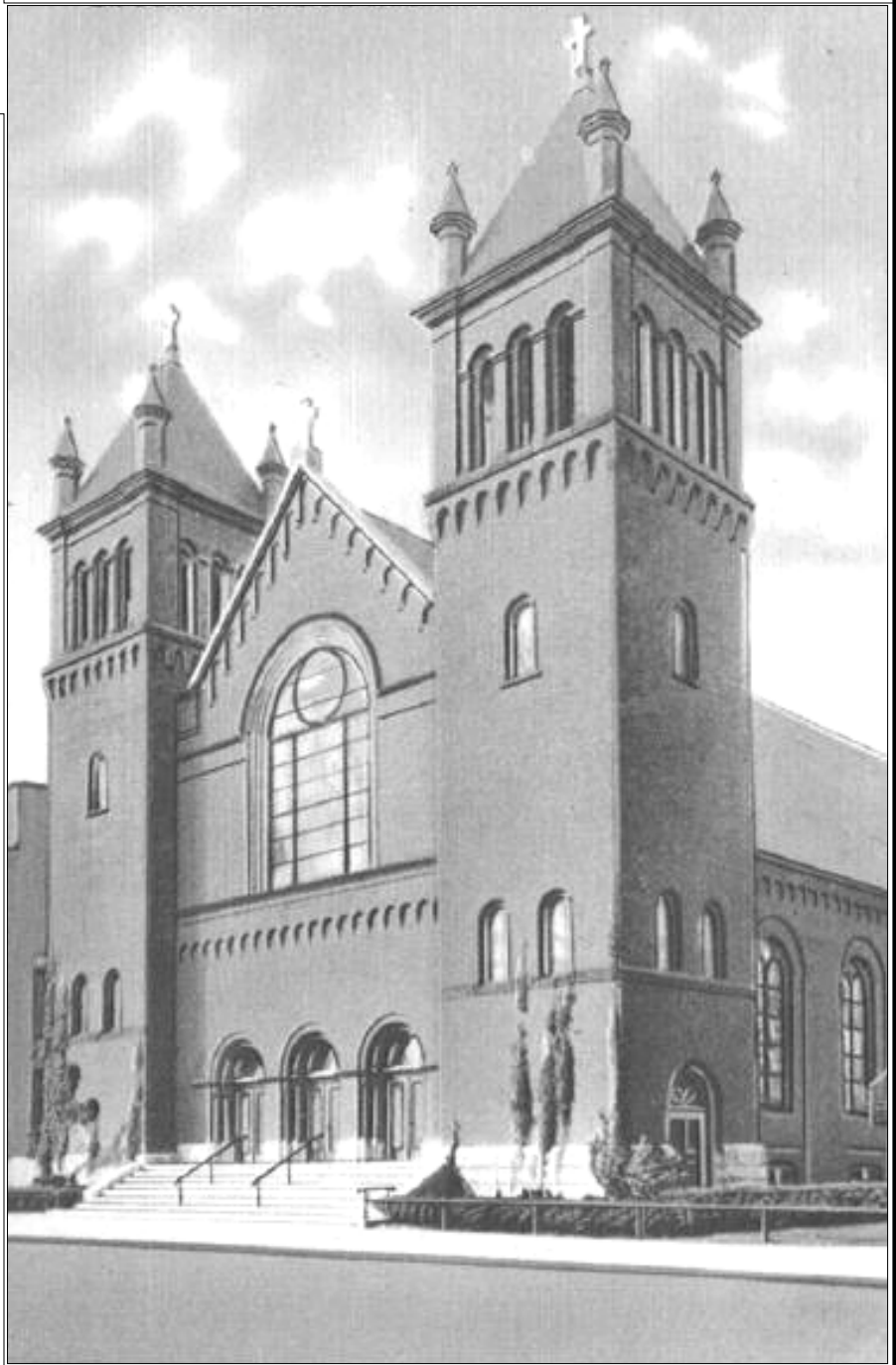

PART-TIME POSITION FOR DEANERY MINISTRY

LENTEN FAST AND ABSTINENCE

All Catholics, from the day following their 14th birthday, are required to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all Fridays of Lent regardless of age.

Catholics, from the day following their 18th birthday until the day following their 59th birthday, are required to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On these days, only 1 full meal may be taken; no eating between meals is allowed. Food may be taken on 2 other occasions during the day, but the combined total must not equal a full meal. Liquids (frappes and milkshakes are NOT considered liquids) do not break the fast. Those whose health truly does not permit fast or abstinence are excused.

“Building on Our Past, Securing Our Future” **St. Patrick's Capital Campaign**

Next weekend is “Commitment Weekend”

Thanks to everyone that attended our campaign receptions during the past several weeks. If you were unable to attend a reception, campaign materials have been mailed to you at home. Additional materials are available at the entrance to the church.

Please bring your completed “Commitment Envelope” to Mass next weekend and place it in the Offertory Collection.

We hope to raise \$850,000 for these projects. As a general "guideline," we suggest that parishioners consider a sacrificial pledge of \$4,000 extended over 3 or 4 years. With a 10% down payment (\$400), your pledge would be \$100/a month for three years or \$75/month for four years. The chart below shows how the pledges work out.

Because our parish has people with a wide range of income and expenses, we hope that each person will consider what his or her "fair share" may be. Every pledge and gift, no matter what the amount, will be greatly appreciated! If everyone makes a fair sacrifice we will be able to reach our goal and get the needed work done.

Corruption

Pope Francis in his new book, The Name of God is Mercy, makes very pointed comments about the mystery of *corruption*. Coming as he does from a Catholic nation notorious for corruption, the Holy Father has had much direct experience with corruption, and so his words are not just theoretical but shaped by his pastoral encounters with practicing Catholics who indeed are corrupt.

Whenever we hear the word *corruption* we usually think of political and economic dishonesty and the betrayal of trust. Of course, we never think of ourselves as being corrupt. Rather corruption in our eyes occurs among “those other people.”

The Holy Father rescues us from this very narrow understanding of corruption and casts the net widely, thereby ensnaring many others in the realm of corruption. What exactly is corruption? Pope Francis says that corruption is sin “elevated to a system [that] becomes a *mental habit*, a way of living.” Worse still, though the corrupt “mental habit” radically contradicts the “mental habit” of the Lord, many people miss the collision of these two “minds.” Why? Because we commonly think of sin as being *exclusively* a direct violation of the Ten Commandments or some Church law. Every priest has heard people say: “I have no sins. After all, I haven’t killed anybody and I go to Mass every Sunday.”

At the root of this corruption is the widespread tendency to live two completely separate lives: my “church” life and “everything else.” This gives birth to what the Holy Father calls “the dry cleaner confession,” which means the endless request to remove the spots on the garment without noticing that the garment is actually rotting away. As St. Alphonsus Liguori warned over 200 years ago, the ritualistic confession of the “stains” without recognizing one’s broader condition as a sinner just like “those other people,” is extremely dangerous. First, its mechanical quality may actually erode all true sorrow for sin. And second, it may completely suppress *gratitude* to God for His forgiveness and lead to presumption, which prevents change.

Pope Francis expresses St. Alphonsus’s concern in a different way: “Sin, especially if repeated, can lead to corruption, not quantitatively but qualitatively: habits are formed that limit one’s capacity to love and create a false sense of self-sufficiency.” Because corruption grows slowly and becomes habitual, a person may not even see it. The Holy Father says that “it’s like a man with bad breath. He doesn’t know it.”

The Holy Father makes a remarkable point: “One may be a great sinner and never fall into corruption.” He cites several examples: Zacchaeus, St. Matthew, the Samaritan woman at the well, and St. Dismas, the good thief. “Their sinful hearts,” he says, “all had something that saved them from corruption. They were open to forgiveness, their hearts felt their own weakness. When a sinner recognizes himself as a sinner, he admits in some way that what he was attached to, or clings to, was false.” The sinners mentioned by Pope Francis were *truly* bad, but they never pretended to be otherwise. By contrast, corrupt people never acknowledge their own sins and, as Pope Francis notes, are always “managing to keep up appearances.”

Pope Francis constantly exhorts people to go to confession, not with the “dry cleaner’s list” but with a thorough, informed, and honest review of one’s whole life. Reading his little book can produce an “examination of conscience” like you’ve never had.
