LENTEN FAST AND ABSTINENCE

All Catholics, from the day following their 14th birthday, are required to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all Fridays of Lent regardless of age.

Catholics, from the day following their 18th birthday until the day following their 59th birthday, are required to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On these days, only 1 full meal may be taken; no eating between meals is allowed. Food may be taken on 2 other occasions during the day, but the combined total must not equal a full meal. Liquids (frappes and milkshakes are NOT considered liquids) do not break the fast. Those whose health truly does not permit fast or abstinence are excused.

Witness to Life: From Politics to the Spiritual

Catholics often feel trapped in our political system when it comes to defending human life. Many candidates declare that they are "pro-life" but after winning they either do nothing or make appointments and decisions that further undermine the right to life. Consider the Supreme Court: During the past 40 years, three presidents, who declared themselves "pro-life," appointed two justices who turned out to be completely "pro-choice" and two others who frequently voted with the "Roe v. Wade" majority. For sure, no one can infallibly predict how a judge will act once he or she sits on the bench; but the bitter disappointments of the past 40 years demonstrate the limits of politics. Politicians are fickle. What is a faithful Catholic to do?

Archbishop Jose Gomez, who leads the Archdiocese of Los Angeles, has called for a new approach. Speaking on January 30, he said: *"The cause of life is greater than the limitations of our political categories. We want a new culture, not a new political coalition. The future of the pro-life movement is cultural not political."*

While we have little or no control over political trends, which increasingly depart from the norms of Christian behavior, we do have the power to shape our "personal culture" -- the way we see and behave toward other people. This goes far beyond the quick act of voting; it penetrates into every moment of our lives.

Archbishop Gomez made the crucial point that the killing of unborn children, older people, and the very sick "happens within a wider cultural context." Our culture, he said, is "losing the sense of our common humanity and our responsibilities to others." This happens because we make sharp distinctions between "us" and "them" based on race, religion, economic condition, legal status and so is on. This breeds the "culture of death" which rests on the belief that some are "more equal than others" and "some are not worthy of life." Such sentiments can strangely coexist with "being pro-life." Some talk show hosts, for example, use coarse language to disparage certain people, in effect depriving them of their human dignity. Such rhetoric shapes the "mindset" of many, and endangers *all* vulnerable people. Indeed, everything is interconnected.

As such, the "spirituality of life" must encompass everything, not just a few issues. While Archbishop Gomez firmly insisted that the protection of unborn children and people threatened by euthanasia is paramount, he described the personal "culture of life" this way: *"To follow Jesus means we have a duty to welcome and protect life and to care for life -- every life! Because every life is loved by God, especially those who are poor and forgotten, and those who are alone and excluded. With God's love there are no boundaries, no borders, no barriers."*

To live out this "spirituality of life" requires conversion of heart. First, we must unlearn the toxic habits of thought that we inhale from the noisy media. And second, to cite Archbishop Gomez, we must *"restore the sense of mercy in our own lives and in our society: mercy for those who make mistakes, mercy for those who are inconvenient and unexpected, mercy on those who impose a burden on our way of life."*

The preceding words of Archbishop Gomez help us to understand why some prefer the political strategy. After all, it takes just a few minutes to vote. It takes a life time to live out the "spirituality of life."
