

Thoughts on MLK Day

As our nation remembers Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. on January 18, we need to recover a frequently forgotten truth: the civil rights movement originated within the Christian faith. Almost all its leaders were ordained ministers, mostly Baptist but from other denominations as well. Dr. King himself held a doctorate in theology from Boston University.

The proposition that all human beings are equal was drawn from Sacred Scripture, not from secular political ideology. Moreover, the committed non-violence of the early civil rights movement attempted to imitate the actual practice of Jesus, who insisted on forgiving enemies and refusing violent retaliation.

Many of the earliest campaigns, such as the efforts to desegregate interstate bus and rail services, had explicitly Christian elements, especially public prayer, Bible reading, and hymn singing. There was no concealment of the Gospel at all.

Many of the earliest civil rights leaders had close connections with the Fellowship of Reconciliation, an old-line Protestant organization that promoted non-violent action in the cause of universal peace. Quakers also had significant influence. The movement, then, was meant to be an actual "experiment" in Gospel living, convincing proof that faith – not brute power – could ultimately heal and shape the world.

Of course, we must always remember that many who opposed racial equality identified themselves as Christians. Shockingly, even the Ku Klux Klan claimed to be a "Christian organization" and used the cross as a much favored symbol.

The movement away from traditional racial segregation caused serious divisions even among Roman Catholics, especially in Louisiana, the only Southern state with a fairly large Catholic population. In 1951, Archbishop Joseph Rummel, who headed the Archdiocese of New Orleans, desegregated the Catholic Church, setting off bitter resistance from some Catholics. Up until that point, Catholic churches had separate "White" and "Colored" pews as well as segregated parochial schools. Archbishop Rummel's decision was especially significant because it occurred three years before the United States Supreme Court declared that "separate but equal" schools were unconstitutional.

Archbishop Rummel promoted racial equality because of theology not legal opinions. In his pastoral letter of 1953, he wrote: Let there be no further discrimination or segregation in the pews, at the Communion rail, at the confessional and in parish meetings, just as there will be no segregation in the kingdom of heaven." In 1956, he appealed to the Book of Genesis: "Racial segregation as such is morally wrong and sinful because it is a denial of the unity and solidarity of the human race as conceived by God in the creation of Adam and Eve."

Of course, not every Catholic accepted Archbishop Rummel's teaching. Indeed, Some Louisiana Catholics actually wrote to Pope Pius XII asking him to *endorse* the continuation of racial segregation! The Holy Father responded by calling racism a grave moral evil.

Without doubt, the post-World War II civil rights movement would never have emerged without its solid Christian foundations. Hence, we must never forget how Christian faith, whether in its Catholic or Protestant form, contributed so much to the healing of America.
