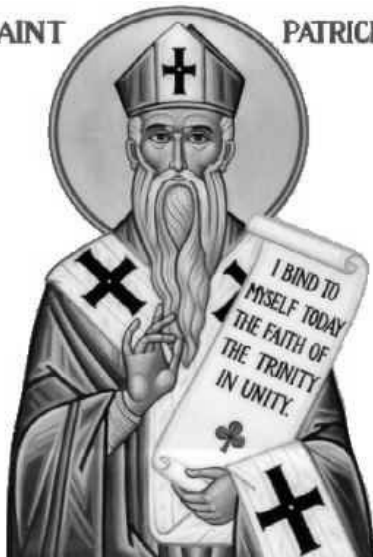

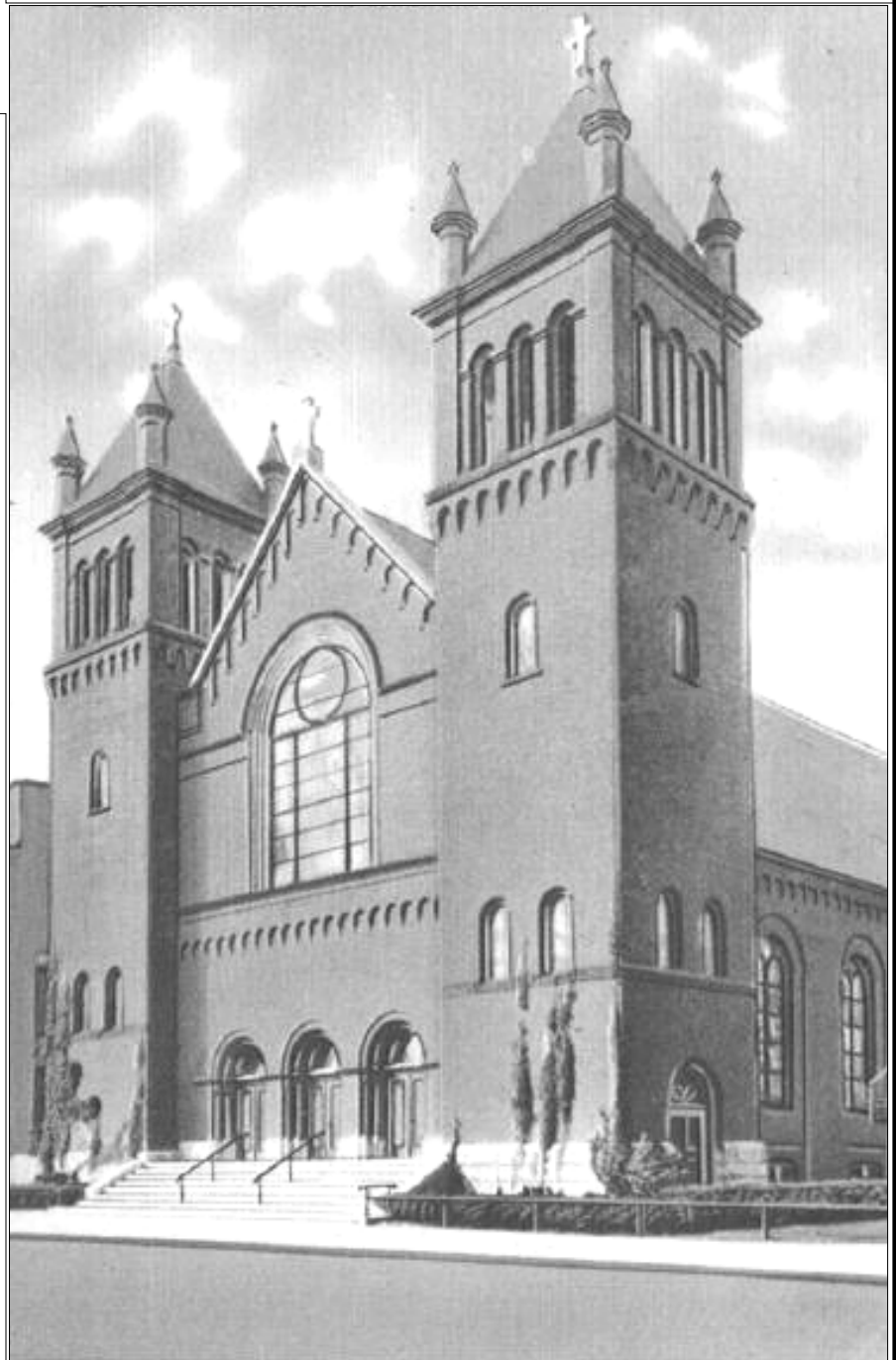

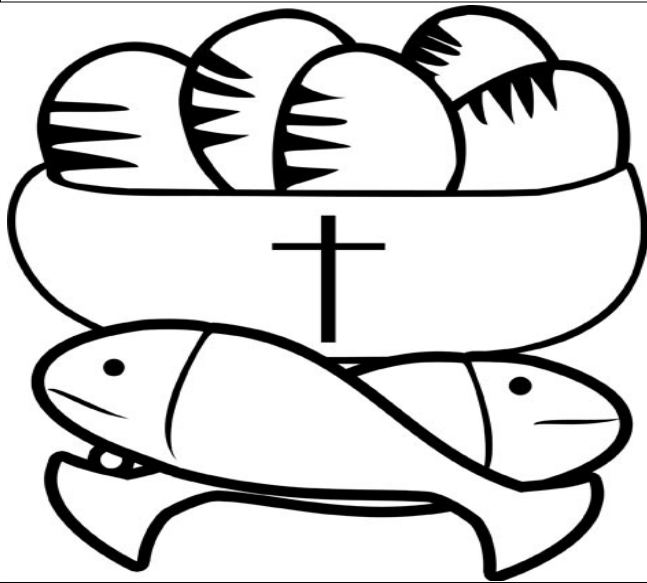

The Jewish Martyrs on the Catholic Calendar

We usually define martyrs as people who suffered and died for the Christian faith. However, the liturgical calendar in the old Roman Missal (1962) contains a commemoration of *non-Christian martyrs* -- the seven Jewish brothers executed under Antiochus Epiphanes, the Greek ruler who attempted to destroy Judaism during the 2nd century BC. The commemoration of the so-called Maccabean Brothers occurs on August 1.

We find the gruesome and graphic account of their ordeal in 2 Maccabees 7:1-42. According to the inspired writer, the seven young men refused the Greek ruler's demand to eat pork. As a result, each was tortured and executed in the presence of his mother, who encouraged her sons to resist to the point of death.

In light of the fact these young men were killed for observing the kosher dietary law, which does not apply to Christians, many will rightly ask: What does "keeping kosher" have to do with us? Why are they on the *Catholic* liturgical calendar? Moreover, they died nearly 170 years before Christ was born! How can they be true martyrs?

These obviously non-Christian young men found a place on the ancient Catholic calendar for two reasons.

First, they died as witnesses to the dignity of conscience. As devout Jewish men, they believed that eating pork was a "mortal sin," to use classical Catholic terminology. In itself, eating pork has no moral dimension. However, in their historical situation, eating pork was equivalent to publicly renouncing one's allegiance to the God of Israel. It was an act of apostasy, something always wrong.

Of course, by our contemporary moral calculation, many would regard the seven brothers as insane. Some would say, "Oh, it's only about a little religious squabble with the Greeks. Surely, God wouldn't mind one little shred of bacon!" And, for sure, the "lesser evil" argument makes an appearance in the biblical story. But the brothers chose death rather than commit sin.

Second, the commemoration of the seven brothers affirms the principle of religious freedom. The brothers died because the Greeks of their time attempted to compel all conquered people to relinquish their religions and to adopt Greek ways of life and belief. As Catholics, we steadfastly oppose the forcible coercion of other people. Though our own history in this regard is far from pure, today no Catholic would ever attempt to impose the faith on unwilling people.

This ancient commemoration of these young Jewish martyrs reminds us that all people of good will somehow mysteriously glorify the One God by following their consciences, adhering sincerely to their own religious beliefs, and respecting the religious freedom of others.

In today's world, filled with so much religious division and animosity, these seven Jewish brothers of the 2nd century BC acquire new and often anonymous companions almost every day.
