Cash, Checks, and E-Giving

In these rapidly changing times, cash and checks are rapidly becoming obsolete. This widespread trend has an impact on our parish. Banks, including ours, now prefer electronic “cashless” transactions.

In light of this remarkable change, we respectfully encourage everyone to consider using the “Bill Pay” service of their bank or credit union. This involves replacing cash or paper checks with an electronic check sent to St. Patrick Parish. Many already do this for their other recurring payments, such as cable TV, insurance premiums, and so on. It is a fairly easy process to add St. Patrick’s. Switching to electronic giving will help the parish in the four ways:

- Saving money by eliminating costly church envelopes.
- Making it easier to generate documentation for tax purposes.
- Simplifying the complex process of counting loose cash in the weekly collection.
- Providing a stable flow of income uninterrupted by vacations and bad weather.

At the moment, about 10% of our income arrives in our bank account in some electronic form. Please take a look at your current on-line “Bill Pay” options and consider helping our parish to adjust to the new ways of the banking system. St. Joseph: Patron of Used and Obscure People

Many people take quick offense at being “used” by others. People expect – and boldly demand – recognition and praise even for fulfilling their stated duties. To live without lavish and constant affirmation is considered a terrible ordeal. The experience of St. Joseph, however, gives us a very different perspective: it reminds us that simple goodness, especially when hidden and forgotten, has immense value in the eyes of God, who sees, remembers, and rewards every good deed we do for others.

St. Joseph, whose feast we celebrate this year on Monday, March 20, can rightly be regarded as the patron saint of the “used,” unrewarded, and unacknowledged people of the world. The gospels portray St. Joseph as a man who was blatantly “used” by God. For example, in St. Matthew’s genealogy of Jesus, St. Joseph is simply described as “*the husband of Mary, of whom Jesus was born, the Messiah*” (Mt 1:16b). In the ancient world, men *never* received their identities from their wives or children because the adult male was always considered active and primary. In the case of St. Joseph, the reverse happens. He is known primarily as Mary’s husband. Indeed, his official title in the church is “husband of Mary.”

With no active role in the generation of Jesus, St. Joseph is clearly secondary and passive. We see this clearly in St. Matthew’s account of the flight into the Egypt. The angel gives this instruction to St. Joseph: “*Get up, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt*” (Mt 2:13b). Note that Mary is not described as St. Joseph’s wife, but as the mother of the Child, who is clearly not his. Here St. Joseph is simply “used” as protector, transporter, and caregiver for a mysterious woman and her Child.

St. Joseph’s obscurity in the gospels carried over into the liturgical life of the Church, which almost totally forgot about him for centuries. Whereas the ancient churches of the East were quickly adorned with multiple icons of Mary, St. John the Baptist, the apostles, and various theologians, St. Joseph was almost never depicted. Amazingly, devotion to St. Joseph in the West didn’t begin until the late 15th century, when his universal feast entered the Roman calendar in 1479.

Incidentally, the greatest promoters of devotion to St. Joseph were two women: St. Bridget of Sweden and St. Teresa of Avila. Perhaps they better understood the experience of being “used” and therefore tried to rescue St. Joseph from the shadows. With the passage of time, the cult of St. Joseph steadily grew in popularity, culminating in 1870 when Pope Pius IX declared St. Joseph “Patron of the Universal Church.” Pope John XXIII also lifted St. Joseph from obscurity by adding his name to the Roman Canon in 1962, the first saint ever added to that ancient Eucharistic prayer.

If you feel unappreciated and overlooked, remember St. Joseph, who did God’s will faithfully and graciously without the slightest hint of resentment or rancor.
