Cash, Checks, and E-Giving

In these rapidly changing times, cash and checks are rapidly becoming obsolete. This widespread trend has an impact on our parish. Banks, including ours, now prefer electronic “cashless” transactions.

In light of this remarkable change, we respectfully encourage everyone to consider using the “Bill Pay” service of their bank or credit union. This involves replacing cash or paper checks with an electronic check sent to St. Patrick Parish. Many already do this for their other recurring payments, such as cable TV, insurance premiums, and so on. It is a fairly easy process to add St. Patrick’s. Switching to electronic giving will help the parish in the four ways:

- Saving money by eliminating costly church envelopes.
- Making it easier to generate documentation for tax purposes.
- Simplifying the complex process of counting loose cash in the weekly collection.
- Providing a stable flow of income uninterrupted by vacations and bad weather.

At the moment, about 10% of our income arrives in our bank account in some electronic form. Please take a look at your current on-line “Bill Pay” options and consider helping our parish to adjust to the new ways of the banking system. Could St. Casimir get elected?

The label "Christian" defines many who hold political office. But what makes a leader truly Christian? St. Casimir, whose feast day occurs on March 4, acts as a "definition in the flesh." Three qualities stand out.

1. Christian leaders are formed by morally good influences, not by "strategy."

St. Casimir, born in Krakow in 1458, was the son of King Casimir IV of Poland who pre-programmed the boy for political power. The king provided his 9-year old son with a brilliant tutor: Fr. John Dlugosz, a holy priest who would become one of Poland's greatest historians. Most important, the priest emphasized faith and ethical behavior over the pursuit of national and personal gain, which guided most other leaders. When St. Casimir got a little older, his father hired a new tutor for him: Flippo Buonaccorsi, a political operative with deep roots in corrupt Roman politics. As a young man, Buonaccorsi had tasted the fruits of moral corruption and fled from Italy when his intrigues failed. St. Casimir, though a teenager, recognized the huge difference between Buonaccorsi and Fr. Dlugosz. He always trusted the priest, not the "consultant," who pushed for centralized state power under the king.

2. Christian leaders promote the common good; personal and even national interests are always secondary.

St. Casimir navigated through a very complex and fluid mix of ethnic and political identities and agendas. His father was mostly Polish; his mother was Austrian. He grew up probably speaking German, Polish, Latin, and possibly Lithuanian. For sure, he loved Poland, but he believed that moral considerations should always supersede national ones. At age 13 (!) he was drawn into his father's scheme to advance Polish power by dominating Hungary. When St. Casimir, still a boy, discerned injustice and imprudence within his father's plans he refused to participate, thus irritating him immensely.

3. Christian leaders recognize absolute moral norms and follow them.

After the Hungarian mess, St. Casimir did much soul-searching. His spiritual life deepened and he began to pray much more, dressed simply, avoided luxury, and practiced penance, including a hair-shirt. Most drastic of all, he took a vow of celibacy. This vow derailed his father's plan for St. Casimir to become the next king. He insisted, however, on keeping his solemn commitment to remain unmarried. No vow would be broken, even to satisfy his father. There's another odd example of his fidelity to moral truth. When he contracted tuberculosis his doctors prescribed a therapeutic plan: begin having sexual relations with multiple women! They believed that his chastity had caused his disease! Of course, he refused: Better to die young than commit a single mortal sin.

Out of filial respect for his father, St. Casimir did exercise political power, notably as the "caretaker" of Poland while his father was in Lithuania for five years. However, he was a totally different type of leader: no self glorification, no self advancement, no fiery language, and no animosity toward anyone.

One must wonder: Could St. Casimir win an election today, even in Poland or Lithuania? Probably not. The ways of Flippo Buonaccorsi are now ascendant; but the ways of St. Casimir and Fr. Dlugosz remain true and good. St. Casimir, pray for us!
