Zombie Catholicism

Emmanuel Todd, a French sociologist, has coined a new term: "Zombie Catholicism." This colorful term refers the stubborn survival of Catholic externals among people who have no understanding or real belief in the Catholic faith. France is the capital of "zombie Catholicism." Though it has hundreds of gorgeous Catholic churches almost no people actually worship in them. (Mass attendance in France is now about 7%.)

"Zombie Catholicism," Todd asserts, emerges in nations and regions that were once almost entirely Catholic, places like France, Belgium, Quebec, Ireland, and so on. "Zombi-azation" happens because almost everyone in those places had inherited Catholicism at birth. This "automatic" Catholicism never required a free choice about one's faith. It was "just there," much like the wallpaper in the living room. For sure, some hearty souls freely embraced or retained a living form of Catholicism, but these have always been a small group.

Despite the resilience of the faithful minority, as one generation passes into the next, the Catholic memory continues to fade, leading many Europeans to declare themselves as having no religion. "Zombie Catholics" will now say that they have a "Catholic background," meaning that some distant ancestors were Catholics. Others use the term "post-Catholic," which means, "I'm not mad at the Church but I have moved beyond the comforting myths and unreasonable restrictions of my childhood."

What is one to do? Pope Francis touches up this trend in "The Joy of Love," his rich reflection on marriage and family life. After acknowledging the many circumstances that interfere with fruitful "faith formation" among children and teenagers, he wrote: *"It's essential that children actually see that, for their parents, prayer is really important. Hence, moments of prayer and acts of devotion can be more powerful for evangelization than any catechism class."* In other words, the lived faith of Catholic parents is the antidote to "Zombie Catholicism."

Here the Holy Father echoes the sentiments of Archbishop Diarmuid Martin of Dublin. Speaking back in 2014, Archbishop Martin candidly admitted: *"Our young people are among the most catechized in Europe and the least evangelized."* They have factual information about Catholicism but nothing of the heart. To make matters worse, almost all the schools in Ireland operate under the "patronage" of the Catholic Church. Hence, they carry the "Catholic brand." But, as Archbishop Martin sadly conceded, many "religion teachers" are *not* believing Catholics yet prepare children for First Holy Communion and Confirmation. Catholicism, then is reduced to a mere "tradition," a quaint custom associated with one's grandparents.

Perhaps this new situation is actually an opportunity for the purification and strengthening of the Church. After all, everyone knows that most converts to Catholicism tend to be more fervent than the "born Catholics" because they have freely chosen the faith. As the "Zombie Catholics" slowly fade away, the Catholics of the future will have freely and consciously embraced the faith, not as a family heirloom but as the living center of their lives.

As Pope Francis has clearly told us, the spiritual lives of children depend on the lived faith of their parents, not on the long dead "traditions" of their ancestors.
