The Eucharistic Humiliation of Christ

Frequently devout Catholics complain about irreverence toward the Blessed Sacrament. These offenses come in many forms: people who leave Mass while chewing the Host, people yakking loudly, people snatching the Host from the priest, people putting the Host in their pockets, people not genuflecting, and so forth. To some, it appears that irreverence is quite new, the product of the “secular age.” However, irreverence to the Eucharistic Lord has always been there. Indeed, it seems that the very possibility of irreverence simply repeats an intrinsic dimension of the Cross – the self-humiliation of Christ.

We see this in many artistic depictions of the Last Supper. For sure, some show the apostles in a prayerful attitude as they receive the Body of Christ for the first time on Holy Thursday. Think of Salvatore Dali’s famous painting. But many others show the apostles acting quite disrespectfully. The rectory dining room, for example, has a small Greek icon of the Last Supper. Upon close inspection, you will see that only one apostle – the Beloved Disciple – faces the Lord. All the others are chatting among themselves, ignoring the Lord and the Eucharistic elements. And Judas is shown reaching across the table and helping himself to Holy Communion!

This shockingly irreverent behavior of the apostles reflects a basic human weakness: *we have very little capacity to discern and endure the Presence of God.* Why? Because we have great trouble turning away from ourselves toward the Other.

The Lord, always compassionate toward our weaknesses, has always understood our struggle to pay attention to Him. And so He claimed only 14.3% of our time – the one-day Sabbath – for mandatory worship and cessation of work. Today, of course, that single day seems to be an extreme demand, and so most devout people reduce it to a single hour (give or take a few minutes), which amounts to .6% of the 168 hours of the week.

When time for public worship and personal attention to God shrinks, so does reverence. How could it be otherwise? As the memory and awareness of God fade quickly, people cannot recognize what the Eucharist is and so treat it as nothing at all. This, of course, can happen even to faithful Catholics – including priests! -- who worship and pray all the time. Everything can become *routine*, which kills the sense of the sacred.

Since most acts of irreverence arise from ignorance, boredom, and inattention, we must assume that very few people actually intend sacrilege. After all, “*They know not what they do.*” And so perhaps these episodes of irreverence call us to ponder the beauty of the Lord’s own *self-humiliation*, which began at the moment of His conception and culminated on the Cross. By repeatedly coming into our midst in the Eucharistic elements, He forever makes Himself completely vulnerable to ingratitude, unbelief, and boredom fostered by routine. After all, no lightning bolts ever shoot out from the Tabernacle, slaying irreverent people. Rather, the Eucharistic Lord calmly, patiently, and silently abides in the Tabernacle, making Himself available even to those do not recognize or honor His presence. Is this not a mysterious repetition of the Last Supper and Calvary? And is not the Eucharist the great memorial of the Lord’s self-humiliation for the sake of humanity?
