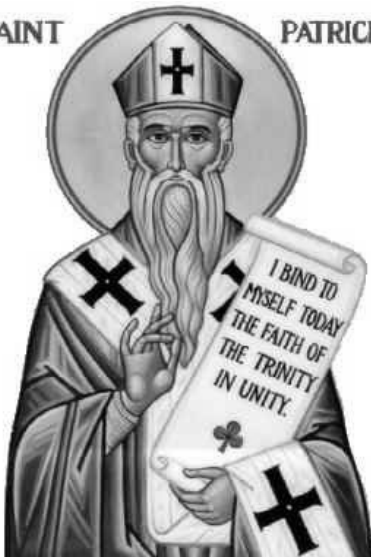

Collections at Mass: The Ancient View

For nearly 2,000 years, the Mass has remained remarkably stable in its essential elements. The sequence of Scripture readings, psalms, homily, consecration of bread and wine, Holy Communion, and final blessing is virtually unchanged. Moreover, to the surprise of many, the Eucharist has almost always had a *collection*, an act that seems mundane and "unspiritual." But the collection, like every element of the Eucharist, has deep spiritual meaning.

We find extensive comments about the collection in the 2nd century text called "The First Apology in Defense of Christians" by St. Justin Martyr. After carefully describing the various "movements" of the Mass, St. Justin wrote: "*Those who are well provided for, if they wish to do so, contribute what seems fit; this is collected and left with the president [the presbyter/priest/pastor], so that he can help the orphans and widows and the sick, and all who are in need for any other reason, such as prisoners and visitors from abroad. In short, he provides for all who are in want.*"

This ancient custom of collecting money had two motives. First, it provided worshippers with an immediate opportunity to imitate the generosity of the Lord who would soon give Himself as the totally free Gift in and through Holy Communion. The old Roman Missal emphasized this reciprocity by requiring the priest to say the following prayer before drinking from the chalice: "*What shall I render to the Lord for all the things he has rendered to me?*" Indeed. Can anyone receive this Gift without wanting to give *something* in return?

Second, the collection, as described by St. Justin, was used *primarily* to improve the condition of the poor and people cut off from the safety of family life. Early Christians understood that worship had to replicate Christ's acts of preaching, healing, and feeding. His work had spiritual "work" had inevitable material consequences. As such, the Church's worship must have both dimensions. After all, how could anyone who partakes of the Body and Blood of Christ fail to honor Christ in the sick, hungry, poor, and displaced?

St. Justin also wrote very delicately about the requirement to contribute. He didn't even specify an amount, such as the traditional 10% tithe from the Old Testament. Instead, he simply said that people should "contribute what seems fit." Because his community probably contained rich and poor, he allowed wide discretion, thereby freeing the poorer people from feeling obligated to match the contributions of the wealthy.

Of course, the Church of St. Justin's time had very few buildings and virtually no administrative expenses. Today, most of what we collect at Mass pays for insurance, utilities, snow plowing, repairs and so on. However, we must remain faithful to the ancient practice of linking the celebration of the Eucharist to material assistance to those in need. We do this through the Poor Box, special collections, and New Hampshire Catholic Charities. Your generosity helps to preserve the Church's noble and holy tradition described by St. Justin.
