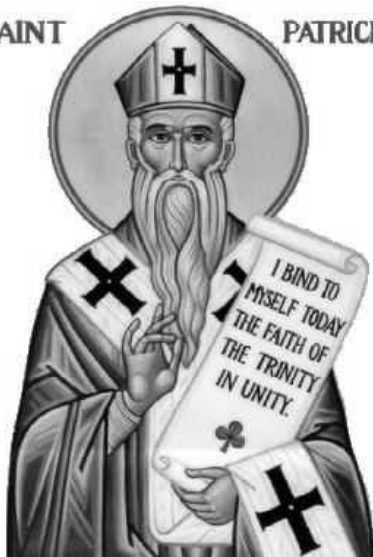

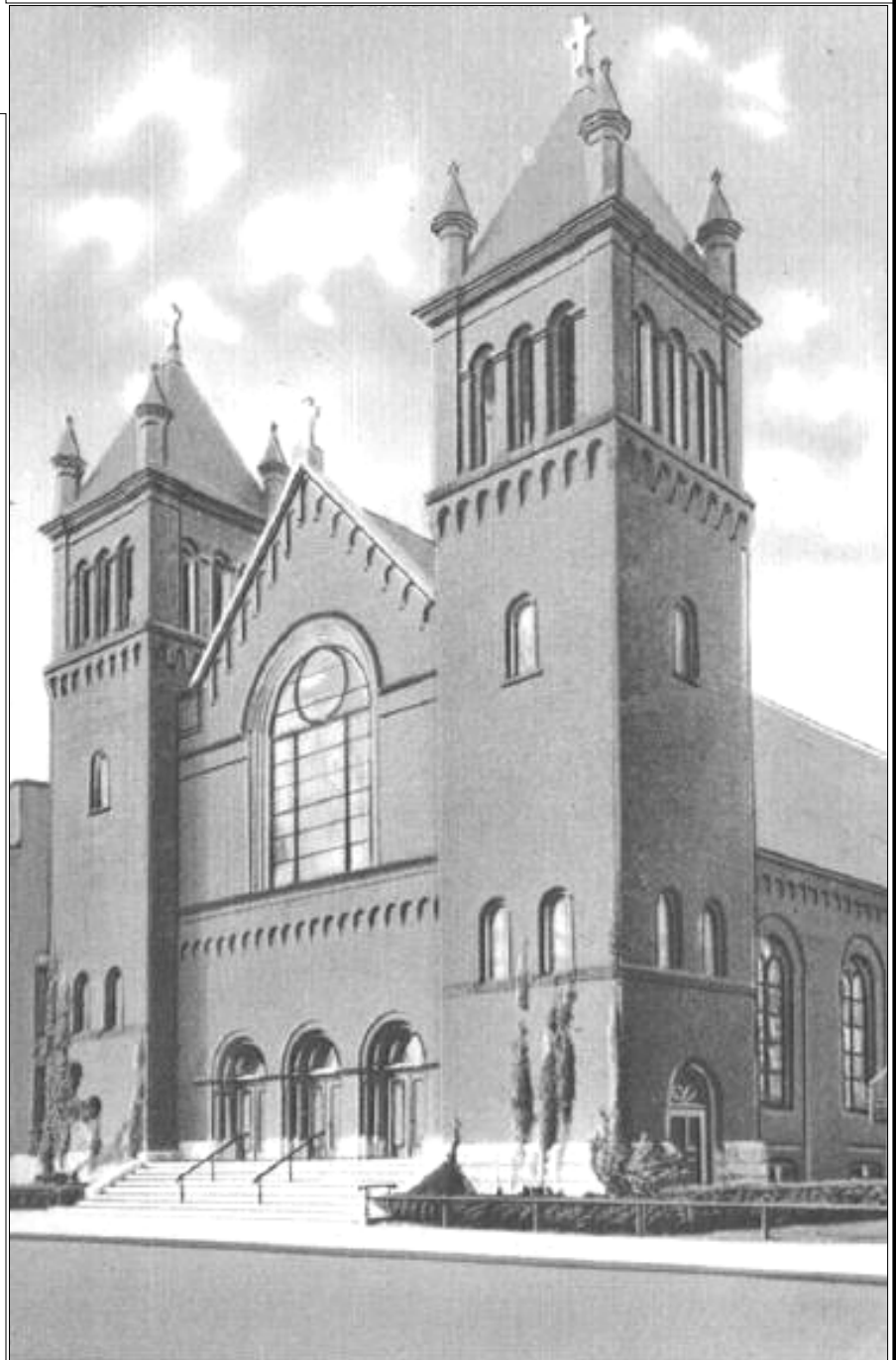

## *Bored to Death*

People don't often think of boredom as a dangerous spiritual malady, but it is. No one knew this better than Georges Bernanos, the great French Catholic novelist who wrote The Diary of a Country Priest in 1936. On the very first page of his beautiful and wise novel, the nameless young priest wrote: "*My parish is bored stiff; no other word for it. Like so many others! We can see them being eaten up by boredom, and we can't do anything about it.*" He went on to describe boredom as being like a pervasive "dust," a deadly powder that silently adheres to everything.

Centuries before Bernanos lived, several great spiritual masters had already identified boredom as a corrosive disease of the spirit. As early as the 4<sup>th</sup> century, Christian hermits living in the deserts of North Africa had written of an experience called *akedia*, a Greek term that means sadness, apathy, lack of interest in life, simple boredom.

Evagrius of Pontus, a theologian of the 4<sup>th</sup> century, nicknamed *akedia* "the noonday demon" because it paralyzed all creative impulses and drove people to total despair because of their constant and unrelieved boredom.

*Akedia* – sheer boredom – happens when people narrow their vision of life and seek ultimate satisfaction in things that are only temporary. Because these limited things never satisfy for very long, people soon slip back into boredom, then frantically seek new forms of experience to lift themselves out of the drudgery of daily existence. But the boredom quickly returns, and the relentless cycle begins anew.

This cyclical movement from boredom to stimulation helps to explain the massive growth of entertainment, celebrity, and professional sports in our advanced technological culture. To stave off boredom, new forms of stimulation accelerate and invade every inch of territory. No space or time is left free for silence, quiet thought, contemplation of beauty, or meaningful personal exchanges among family members. For example, one will now see many family groups caught up in individual activities such as texting, listening to music through ear buds or watching tiny movies while sitting at table.

Of course, the problem here is not the enjoyment of music or movies. Rather the real danger is that the relentless battle against boredom fosters intense personal isolation. This chronic withdrawal into the isolated "self" blinds people to an essential truth: True and lasting satisfaction is discovered only *beyond oneself* and *with other people*. By contrast, constant self-absorption obliterates the memory of God and eliminates the need for religion.

For Evagrius and other ancient spiritual masters, *akedia* had only one sure cure: the gradual reorientation the human gaze *outward* toward the vast expanse of what exists beyond the small suffocating self. Otherwise, even 10,000 songs and videos in a person's pocket can't save anyone from being bored to death.
