

Vestments and Superiority

Among Christians, the most ancient and elaborate vestments have survived within the Catholic and Orthodox Churches. However, many contemporary people, even some Catholics, dislike vestments, seeing them as a way to elevate clergymen over the baptized faithful. Indeed, some Protestant denominations adamantly refuse to allow vestments, except perhaps an academic robe. And many evangelical ministers wear standard business attire when preaching or conducting services.

Living as we do in an anti-hierarchical and democratic world, it is somewhat amazing that vestments have survived in the Catholic Church. Thorstein Veblen (1857-1929), a very quirky economist from Wisconsin, offered an explanation. According to Veblen, vestments actually mark the clergymen as *lower* -- not *higher* -- than the ordinary faithful.

In his classic work, <u>The Theory of the Leisure Class</u> (1899), Veblen wrote: "Priestly vestments show, in accentuated form, all the features that have been shown to be evidence of a servile state and vicarious life." Vestments, Veblen insisted, serve as uniforms, much like the garb of butlers and footmen employed by the wealthy. Employers, by mandating and providing the uniforms worn by their domestic servants, forcefully assert their superiority over the servants. And, considering that most vestments are owned by the parish not the priest, the richness, expense, and high quality of the vestments say much more about the "owners" than the "wearers," who, after all, simply "borrow" the sacred clothing.

Veblen's musings about vestments also touch upon the usually unacknowledged "love/ hate relationship" between clergy and laity, especially within the more "mature" and "traditional" forms of Christianity, notably Catholicism, Anglicanism, and Lutheranism. These more "formal" Christians, according to Veblen, have great respect for the *office* of the priest/ pastor, but not necessarily for the human beings who hold the office. The ancient vestments, then, separate -- and protect -- the clergy from the laity, much as the butler's uniform acts as a clear boundary between master and servant. Veblen, certainly not a believing Christian, saw the clergy as the hired servant/butler, not the other way around.

Vestments, of course, come and go. We must always remember that *all* the vestments in the Catholic wardrobe are stylized versions of common ancient Roman garments. As fashion changed, the Church just kept the old clothes around, probably without too much thought about why. In their original form, they symbolized nothing. Gradually, they acquired sacred meanings, none of which ever asserted superiority of the priest over the people. We see this, for example, in the long-standing practice of compelling the priest to *conceal* his stole -- the symbol of priestly authority -- while celebrating the Eucharistic Sacrifice. The priest wears the stole *under* his chasuble, the symbol of charity, thereby signifying the priority of love over authority.
