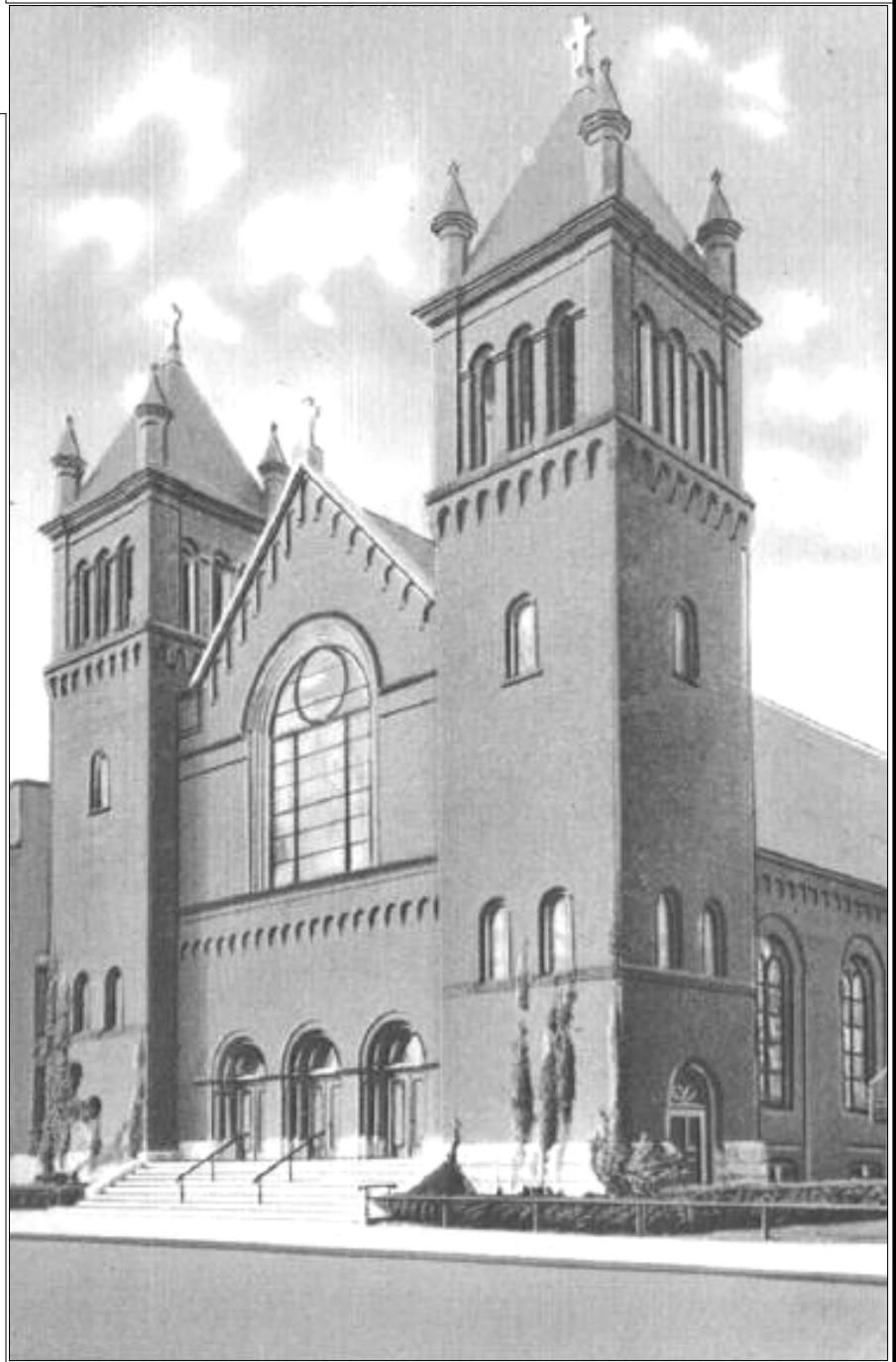

St. Patrick's contentious offspring

Every year on St. Patrick's Day, Irish-Catholics celebrate the unity, purity, and piety of the Irish Church. But there's one big problem here: The Catholic Church in Ireland has always had a fair share of internal conflict and tension with many Popes.

The Catholic Church in Ireland, which already existed before the arrival of St. Patrick in 431, has two unusual features that contributed to its contentious spirit.

First, the Irish Church in its primitive form did *not* follow the standard Roman pattern of having individual bishops linked with specific geographical areas. Instead of geography, Irish Church organization followed the contours of the Irish clan system. Each extended family grouping -- the clan -- had its own bishop and clergy. This highly unusual practice did two things: first, it established a very close link between people and their clergy, many of whom were blood relatives; and second, it vastly multiplied the number of Irish bishops, many of whom had no dioceses. The "clan clergy" tended to live together under a bishop in a monastery. This arrangement, of course, impeded the development of parishes because the clergy were concentrated in the monasteries rather than scattered through the nation. Rome viewed these peculiarly Irish arrangements with great suspicion and enlisted the English to bring the Irish into conformity with the Roman "model." Following the so-called English conquest in 1172, many Englishmen were appointed as bishops in Ireland and gradually dismantled the old clan system, replacing it with the Roman system.

The bitter Irish memory of English-Roman cooperation never completely evaporated. As such, some Catholic priests, including prominent professors at Maynooth, the national seminary built by Queen Victoria, promoted "Gallicanism," especially in the middle of the 19th century. According to the Gallicans, national churches should select their own bishops and develop their own liturgical rites. The Pope, the Gallicans insisted, should have no real power beyond Rome.

Second, the Irish clergy were virtually unique in Europe for having clear *republican* sympathies. Republican here means the political ideology that opposed monarchy and other forms of hereditary systems of power. Today Americans take *republicanism* for granted. After all, who would want a king or queen? But in the 18th and 19th centuries, almost no Catholics -- especially among the clergy! -- supported republicanism because it was seen as an ungodly offshoot of the philosophical Enlightenment. Many Irish, however, tried to reconcile Enlightenment thought with Catholicism, a difficult task at the time.

The republican sympathies of some Irish Catholic clergymen and prominent lay leaders produced three other surprising positions: separation of church and state, the de-coupling of religion from education, and Catholic-Protestant cooperation. These ideas, which now seem common-place, were once considered extremely radical, even heretical.

Among Irish bishops and priests fierce battles raged through the centuries between liberals and conservatives, radical nationalists (Fenians!) and supporters of continued union with Britain, traditionalists and modernists, papal supporters and Gallicans. For sure, the descendents of St. Patrick's early converts have always enjoyed a good argument -- then and now.
