Holy Week Collections

During Holy Week, we have two traditional collections that require explanation.

On **Holy Thursday** the entire collection at the evening Mass is transferred to our parish St. Vincent De Paul Society, which provides much assistance to the poor and needy who come our way. This seems fitting because the rite of foot washing, which occurs at Mass, is meant to foster the spirit of charity toward others. The ritual without the deeds of mercy seems quite empty. Hence, the collection allows each person to heed the Lord's command to imitate His act of personal service.

The collection received on **Good Friday** at the Solemn Liturgy of the Passion and Stations of the Cross goes to support the ancient Christian shrines in the Holy Land. A portion also supports the small and endangered Christian community that bravely resides in that region of the world. This custom of supporting the shrines is a longstanding practice in the Catholic Church.

On **Easter Sunday** and at the **Easter Vigil** we have our standard weekly collection. In the spirit of Easter joy, many people use this occasion to support St. Patrick's Parish with a very generous gift that exceeds their ordinary weekly contribution. The Easter Collection always helps us move toward a balanced budget. If you regularly use envelopes, please use the Easter envelope in your packet. LENTEN FAST AND ABSTINENCE

All Catholics from the day following their fourteenth birthday, are required to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all Fridays of Lent regardless of age.

Catholics, from the day following their eighteenth birthday until the day following their fifty-ninth birthday, are required to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On these days only one full meal may be taken; no eating between meals is allowed. Food may be taken on two other occasions during the day, but the combined total must not equal a full meal. Liquids (frappes and milk shakes are not considered liquids) do not break the fast. Those whose health truly does not permit fast or abstinence are excused.

Worshipping the Wood of the Cross?

At the solemn liturgy on Good Friday, the priest holds the Cross aloft and three times sings, “This is the wood of the Cross.” The choir responds, “Come let us worship.” For many, this direct focus on the “wood” seems strange, even a bit idolatrous. After all, do we not worship God alone, not wood?

Here we must understand the “wood” as the visible manifestation of God’s merciful desire to save humanity. Hence, the “worship” of the Cross actually reaches God; it does not terminate in the “thing.”

We discover the richer and broader meaning of the “wood” by examining the beautiful Latin hymn which begins with the words “*Pange lingua.*” This hymn, written by a man named Fortunatus in the 6th century, has been part of the classical Latin liturgy for many centuries. In his hymn, Fortunatus mentions three forms of the wood.

First, he includes a beautiful reference to the manger, obviously constructed from wood. As Jesus emerges from the womb of His mother, His flesh immediately contacts wood, a foreshadowing of the “wood of the Cross.” To reinforce the connection with the Passion, Fortunatus describes Mary’s act of wrapping His body in “a tight-drawn band that fastens the hands and feet of God.” Here we have an image of the Jewish burial custom of wrapping corpses in strips of cloth. What Mary did on the day of His birth before placing him on the wood of the manger, she will repeat when His dead body is removed from the wood of the cross.

Second, Fortunatus focuses much attention to the “wood of the Cross,” but he “personalizes” the tree, addressing it as if it could hear his words and respond. The tree is not viewed as an enemy of Christ. Instead, Fortunatus praises it as “noble in its glory among all other trees.” The tree willingly accepts its task as the instrument of death, but it also serves as the grand throne from which the Savior rules as King. Likewise, Fortunatus speaks of the nails as “loving” because they held the body of Christ in place so that He could complete the plan of salvation.

Third, Fortunatus points to yet another wooden object: Noah’s ark! Addressing the wood of the Cross, Fortunatus says, “You alone were worthy to bear the victim of the world and, *like the ark*, to give shelter to a shipwrecked world – an ark which the sacred blood, poured from the body of the Lamb, has anointed.” Here we have a recollection of God’s saving will manifested by His rescuing of Noah and his family. Noah’s wooden ark saved a small segment of humanity; through the wood of the Cross the Lord offers salvation to all.

This ancient Latin hymn helps us to look at the Cross in a new way. Though Divine love culminates in the historical death of Christ, the wood of the Cross manifests the infinite love of God that extends endlessly backwards and forward. When we “worship” the Cross, then, we really worship God, who is love.
